

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


The Zero Violence Brave Club: A Successful Intervention to Prevent and Address Bullying in Schools

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Bullying among peers in schools is a growing problem affecting children and adolescents from an early age worldwide. The consequences of bullying victimization in the emotional development of children and youth and their academic achievement are adverse for them and the rest of the school community, with its negative impact extending into the mid and long run. The Zero Violence Brave Club is implemented in schools in the framework of the Dialogic Model of Violence Prevention, a successful educational action according to the INCLUD-ED project [Strategies for inclusion and social cohesion in Europe from Education] (6th Framework Program of Research of the European Commission). The Zero Violence Brave Club has decreased peer bullying in schools by establishing and cultivating a culture of zero tolerance to violence in educational centers located in diverse socioeconomic and cultural contexts. This evidence-based intervention is grounded in the principle that only the person who denounces violence suffered by a peer and takes a stand always on the victim's side -and those who support her or him-against the aggressor can be considered brave. This article reports a gualitative study of the Zero Violence Brave Club as a successful intervention in seven schools in Spain. The schools are diverse in terms of public or private ownership, religious or lay background, and population served (different proportions of cultural minorities and students with special needs), challenging the misconception that the impact of educational interventions depends on the context. Interviews were conducted with teachers in the schools implementing the Zero Violence Brave Club in their class, using the communicative methodology of research. The results shed light on specific mechanisms through which the Zero Violence Brave Club prevents and responds to bullying in schools, such as emptying of social attractiveness any aggressive behaviors or attitudes. Benefits on mental health and psychological wellbeing are also reported.


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

- Creation of violence-free environments through dialogue.
- Training of teachers and the educational community in the scientific evidence for the prevention of violence.



I'm telling you this because you're my cousin and I don't like it that you behave in this way and I'm telling you because I like you (Boy 10 years old)

- B: In "Brave Club" we don't do things by force we do them with our brains and our mouths.
- *G: "Brave Club" means no teasing, no threatening, no insulting and always taking sides.*
- B: (...) We left him at playtime and said: "today, you're staying here, we're not letting you play with us because you have been teasing our friend". He soon came back to ask to be forgiven and asked if he could play with us again and we let him.
- G: If you tease, if you insult if you threaten if you cheat then you're being a coward.
- B: (...) Then he started to behave like a "Brave" and now he's our friend again.

They associate the **workplace without violence as something attractive.** The tell-tales are suddenly no longer tell-tales and the **children that were once 'invisible' are now important** and come here to tell you what's happening and are relaxed. Before they came with fear (...). Violence has reduced dramatically, for example at playtime now they behave a lot better. The "bully" has to accept the critics and the isolation and that hurts them.

Successful stories and voices

"When I have told of injustices or violence no one has attacked me or made fun of me, I feel safe." (Boy)

There are many people who are there and people are not always alone and that is why it is so difficult to try to attack, there are two options, the person who has been bullied tells or someone sees it and tells, that is why it is so difficult. If in the school there is not that kind of zero violence brave club, people, it is easier, it is easier to be bullied" (Boy) "I think that indeed P. has changed 100%. Like they picked on him at the other school, and when this happened he got into fights. He came here and discovered respect, the Zero Violence Brave Club,... it took him a while, but [now] he understands what is right, what is wrong and if he sees his sister laughing at someone, he goes and tells her: you shouldn't do that because that's not for the brave, that's for cowards, you have to respect, you have to have respect. I think he has significantly changed in that, above all, in the respect for others" (Teacher)
